More Than A Military Policy

The Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention Program also known as SHARP guides the Army's efforts in the prevention of and response to sexual harassment, sexual assault and associated retaliatory behaviors. The Army SHARP policy ensures effective communications with internal and external stakeholders. There are multiple stakeholders outlined in the policy such as a Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC) and Commander. Sergeant First Class (SFC) Teray Bundy is the SARC for the 529th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion. The SARC ensures that appropriate victim response care is given to victims of sexual assault or harassment.

Commanders are responsible for ensuring that the SHARP policy is enforced and that events are regularly scheduled to address the program's mission. SFC Bundy takes this program and his role very seriously as it is an important policy. The Army has zero tolerance for sexual harassment and sexual assault. The effectiveness of the commitment to eliminate acts of sexual assault and harassment starts with reinforcing a positive work environment for service members. The SHARP policy is intertwined with the Army's core values. Soldiers must uphold the Army values and exemplify a unified mindset to combat against sexual harassment and assault.
