Honoring Patriot Day: Day of Remeberance

On September 11th, Soldiers from Task Force Cavalier came together to honor the memory of the lives lost during the tragic events of September 11th, 2001, as part of the nation's annual observance of Patriot Day. FOS Karliki Lends A Helping Hand in Zagan

Thirty National Guard, Reserves, and Active-Duty Unit Soldiers recently teamed up with the Polish Army and local emergency medical services (EMS) in Zagan, Poland, to combat rising floodwaters threatening the region. Heavy rainfall in the area caused river levels to surge, endangering homes, infrastructure, and local communities. In a show of solidarity and cooperation, these Soldiers worked with Polish military personnel and emergency responders, filling hundreds of sandbags to create barriers against the advancing floodwaters.

The U.S. military presence in Poland, part of ongoing joint operations and training with NATO allies, highlights the deepening relationship between the two nations. This flood response effort demonstrated military readiness and a shared commitment to protecting civilian populations. Soldiers on the ground expressed pride in assisting their Polish counterparts, and the collaboration was a testament to the strong ties between the U.S. and Poland, both on the battlefield and in disaster response situations.

For the community of Zagan, the joint effort brought hope and tangible results. Residents have long relied on their military and emergency services in times of crisis, and this partnership with U.S. forces bolstered their confidence. As the floodwaters continued to rise, the swift and effective action of these teams proved essential in minimizing damage and protecting lives. The sandbagging efforts were just one part of a broader coordinated response aimed at preserving the safety and well-being of the region.

Newest Graduates of Basic Leader's Course

Twenty-seven Soldiers from Task Force Cavalier have recently enrolled in the Basic Leaders Course (BLC) at Camp Normandy in Grafenwoehr, Germany. BLC is a critical training program designed to equip Soldiers with foundational leadership skills, regardless of their military occupational specialty (MOS). The four-week course focuses on developing the knowledge and experience required to lead team-level units effectively. BLC is a branch-immaterial course that prepares Soldiers from all branches for leadership roles. The Soldiers at Camp Normandy are immersed in this essential training to become more capable and confident leaders in the Army.









Saber Junction Exercise

During the Saber Junction Exercise, Staff Sergeant Jason Dotterweich had the privilege of serving as the Shift NCOIC (Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge) for the OPFOR (Opposing Force) Intelligence section. In this role, he oversaw critical intelligence operations and ensured coordination within our team. Staff Sergeant (SSG) Dotterweich states "A key part of my duties involved managing the UAS (Unmanned Aerial Systems) collection. This technology enabled us to gather real-time intelligence on enemy movements and activities, providing a tactical advantage." He was extremely proud of his ability to help assist during this exercise.


The responsibility for creating detailed intelligence assessments was crucial in shaping OPFOR's strategy and decision-making. Command Sergeant Major (CSM) Joshua Lothspeich and Lieutenant Colonel (LTC) Dan Huff awarded two Noncommissioned Officers from Task Force Cavalier Staff Sergeant Wyatt Bockler and Sergeant First Class (SFC) Shane O'Farrell from the 356th Transportation Company with the Army Achievement Medal during the Saber Junction Exercise. This experience sharpened their leadership skills and deepened their understanding of battlefield intelligence operations, especially in a dynamic, joint-multinational training environment like Saber Junction. The combination of fast-paced decision-making and teamwork during this exercise made it a valuable and transformative experience.



Avenger Triad Exercise

Task Force Cavalier was honored to participate in the Avenger Triad exercise, a large-scale, realistic simulation conducted under the V Corps Division. This operation allowed for service members to work closely with our NATO allies, testing our ability to execute complex missions in a joint environment. A key component to the exercise was the Protection Cell, a critical component in coordinating efforts with the 1st Cavalry Division Sustainment Brigade (ICDSB) and the 317th Military Police Battalion, based in Poznan. Additional support within the cell came from 2LT Joseph Littel of the 541st Transportation Company and 1LT George Solorzano from the 356th Transportation Company, whose contributions were invaluable to the mission.

This exercise emphasized the importance of effective collaboration and decision-making at the highest levels of leadership during large-scale operations. Working under senior commanders' guidance, service members conducted rapid battlefield analysis and implemented swift adjustments to unit protection strategies. The Avenger Triad exercise highlighted the challenges of modern warfare and reinforced the necessity of adaptability and coordination across multinational forces to achieve mission success.
